ith so many humanitarian crises creating refugees and displaced people around the world over the last year, my thoughts have naturally turned to what we can do to support refugees and asylum seekers here in Australia.

It has been pleasing to see our Mercy Connect program go from strength to strength. We are now working with more refugee school children than ever. The programs in Sydney and Melbourne continue to expand as more volunteers are trained and join our efforts. Mercy Connect Ballarat, which started last year, has also continued to grow and is now very well established. Our Mercy Connect volunteers and the support staff who work with them have a real and positive impact on the lives of refugee families.

As many of our activities are in Papua New Guinea and with refugees coming to Australia, the announcement that asylum seekers are to be processed and settled in PNG, a country struggling to deal with many significant social and economic issues, is naturally of great concern to Mercy Works. The longer term impact of settling refugees in PNG is worrying.

Our own workers at Mercy Works office in Sydney have been temporarily displaced this year as the office underwent a complete refit. We are grateful to the Institute of the Sisters of Mercy of Australia and Papua New Guinea for the redevelopment of their building and for the smart new space that our workers have recently moved back into. Mercy Works is now located on one floor and the reconfigured space means we have room to grow in future.

Despite the temporary alternative accommodation, the office continued to run

smoothly to support our work in the field. I would like to thank our Executive Director, Ailsa Mackinnon RSM for her stewardship of Mercy Works over the year.

As well as our physical premises, our online presence was also completely redesigned in 2012. The new website has helped us to fulfil our educational remit more thoroughly, providing easily accessible information, including a new range of fact sheets on all our programs for schools, friends and supporters.

In the midst of this change, we have continued to develop and expand our projects in Australia, Papua New Guinea and Timor-Leste. We are also supporting two new projects for indigenous children, in Alice Springs and on Bathurst Island.

As our work has expanded, so too have requests for our help. The vital support of our friends and donors has been all the more important in raising funds to enable our programs. Everyone at Mercy Works is grateful for your continuing support and ask that you spread the news of our activities to your many connections. By encouraging your friends to become Friends of Mercy Works and to make donations you are helping ensure a stable funding base for our work.

Finally I would like to thank all the members of the Mercy Works board for their time and expertise in serving on the board. It is a considerable commitment which everyone undertakes with a heartwarming enthusiasm.
