Chair's report

ercy Works Ltd celebrated its 20th birthday in April this year. The organisation as we know it today, came into being as a result of many years of extraordinary dedication and hard work undertaken by the Sisters of Mercy on behalf of the most marginalised and vulnerable. From providing education in remote Indigenous communities to prison visitation in PNG to education in Pakistan, the Mercy Sisters were renowned for living amongst and walking beside the people whose lives they sought to improve.

Today, each of the four congregations of the Sisters of Mercy in Australia are active and generous members of the company. Current directors of Mercy Works are a mix of lay and religious, men and women, Catholic and non-Catholic. What ties all of these individuals and groups to their Mercy predecessors, is their united dedication to the mission of Mercy. That mission, founded by Catherine McAuley in Dublin, continues.

There were no celebrations for our birthday. The COVID-19 pandemic has impacted all facets of life. Forced isolation has been a challenge for everyone, with some suffering significant mental health challenges as a result. Technology has been a saving grace. It has provided a form of connection that our predecessors could never have dreamed of. We've found ourselves surprised at how much can be achieved via electronic platforms, and I hope that the best of those possibilities will be embraced as we slowly work our way beyond the pandemic. It remains true however, that there are circumstances and times (both professional and personal) when there is simply no replacement for people being fully engaged with each other in the same room.

Of course, Mercy Works projects have also been affected. While the needs of the vulnerable and disenfranchised have not diminished, the ability to achieve change has been more challenging than ever. There has also been an impact on donations, as some of our major donors (including schools and individuals) have been unable to provide their usual level of support. Other donors have provided extra support, in the awareness that our programs might be suffering from the economic slowdown.

With school closures, Mercy Connect volunteers have been unable to continue their work in schools. Instead, our co-ordinators gathered by Zoom and planned for future projects. In Papua New Guinea, life and skills training was able to continue. Women in Goroka learned how to create products to take to market, helping them find both confidence and financial security. Fifty-five women and men have graduated from small to medium enterprise (SME) training in Mt. Hagen, which assists them in learning how to transfer their existing skills into successful small businesses.

In the remote region of Maucatar in Timor-Leste, Mercy Works is supporting a nutrition project, working to improve the protein levels of pregnant women and their children. Of the many challenges Timor-Leste faces, the education and health of its children is among the most important.

We said hello to the Mini Bilum online in April this year, so that even in the midst of a pandemic, we could still communicate the stories of the people involved in our projects. We hope you have enjoyed the shorter and more frequent 'bite sized' stories. The Mini Bilum followed our projects from lockdown to restart, and enabled us to share our response to events much closer to real time, such as the West Papuan Refugee emergency in Kiunga, PNG. These are the same stories of change we have provided in The Bilum, just in a different way. We look forward to sharing the Mini Bilum with you again next year.

To the dedicated volunteers who have remained connected and committed to our domestic projects throughout the pandemic, thank you. To my fellow directors, my sincere thanks to all of you for your unswerving generosity of expertise and time. To our amazing staff, who have managed to keep our programs running, even in spite of a global pandemic, my deep thanks.

To our wonderful supporters, whether you've been supporting Mercy Works for twenty years or whether you have only recently found us, thank you. It goes without saying that we could not walk with the marginalised without you.

At the end of a difficult year for all, I hope you are filled with the peace and wonder of the Christmas season and the hope of a better year to come. ■

Project review

Mercy Works supported numerous projects across three countries in 2019-2020. Some of our development activities focusing on health, education and skills training are highlighted below.

OVERSEAS PROJECTS

EDUCATION AND SKILLS TRANING

Papua New Guinea

- Access to Education Scholarship program for tertiary students at 10 Institutions who are financially underprivileged and from remote areas.
- Supporting the Catherine McAuley Child
 Care Centre, Kiunga with teaching resources.
- Senior Teachers Academy, Kiunga to upskill teachers to become principals.
- Scholarships for students studying to become teachers at Sacred Heart Teacher's College, Port Moresby who would otherwise be unable to afford the tuition fees.
- Radio Programs informing the Goroka and Mt. Hagen communities and surrounding areas of available skills training and highlighting current social justice issues.
- Raising awareness of the importance of human rights and social issues.
- Training in prevention of sexual and gender based violence in villages along the Fly River.
- Training in income-producing skills for male and female adults and youth in sewing, floriculture, food preservation and farming.
- Training in establishing small business enterprises and ongoing support (SME).
- Drop-in and referral centres in Goroka and Mt. Hagen providing information and support for youth.



HEALTH

Papua New Guinea

- Training village health volunteers in remote regions around Kiunga to promote healthier communities, with particular focus on pregnancies.
- Women's Wellness Program to raise awareness of causes and treatment of HPV Cervical Cancer in Wewak.
- The Family Peace Project building improved family relationships and working towards reducing violence and abuse against women and children.
- Supplying a nutritious meal for students at the Catherine McAuley Child Care Centre, Kiunga.

Timor-Leste

 Improving protein intake for pregnant mothers at the Teresa Orsini Maternity Clinic in Maucatar through the provision of eggs.

DOMESTIC PROJECTS

REFUGEE AND ASLYUM SEEKER SUPPORT

- Mercy Connect volunteer mentoring for refugee and asylum seeker students in primary and secondary schools in Sydney, Melbourne, Perth and Ballarat/Bendigo.
- Mercy House of Welcome in Adelaide provides Adult Literacy Classes and pro bono legal services to asylum seekers.

INDIGENOUS SUPPORT

- Mercy Access volunteer mentoring program to increase secondary education completion rates for students in Shepparton schools.
- Gowola Homework Club in Shepparton helps students improve academic performance, especially in literacy and numeracy.
- In partnership with the Baabayan Aboriginal Corporation to support young aboriginal mothers improve their connection to culture through art classes. Also, provides early childhood education to their children who would otherwise not have access to this. ■
